THE STRATEGY FOR DOWNTOWN LAFAYETTE MOVES CLOSER TO COMPLETION

n 2007, facing development pressures and an antiquated 20-year old plan, Lafayette initiated an ambitious and visionary project to determine the future of our downtown. The "Lafayette Downtown Strategy and Specific Plan" provides a framework, design guidance, and an action plan to promote the community's vision for Downtown Lafayette. This vision was developed after considering public opinions gathered via community surveys, a dozen meetings with a Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) and several public workshops. The broad community vision describes downtown Lafayette as:

A downtown that retains its small town charm, is vibrant with pedestrian activity, is safe and comfortable, offers a variety of unique shopping and dining choices, and has a unique combination of built form and landscape character that is in keeping with its surrounding natural environment - characterized by oak-studded hillsides and cool, shady creeks. It is a downtown that encourages economic activity beneficial to the community through the encouragement of small local businesses and the enhancement of its tax base - generating revenue that continues to enhance and maintain a high quality public space

The key recommendations of the Specific Plan can be summarized as follows:

Establish Districts

The downtown is envisioned as a series of interconnected districts (see inside), each with its own special character and mix of functions and uses. The Plan defines and guides these districts so as to amplify and enhance their unique qualities, and to distinguish them from the other districts through land use regulations, public space improvements (i.e. streets and parks), and building form.

Strengthen the Downtown Core Area

The Downtown Core – comprised of the Downtown Retail, Downtown Civic/Cultural and Downtown Residential Districts – is a priority zone. Within the Core, the Plan calls for new housing opportunities for seniors and young families, improved pedestrian and bike connections to BART, and new retail activity.

Create Downtown Parks and Creek Greenways

A series of new downtown parks and creek greenways are recommended in the Downtown Core. The highest priority is given to improvements near La Fiesta Square. Specifically, the Plan envisions a Town Green as an extension of the thriving La Fiesta Square area, strengthening the heart of downtown and providing public space for recreation activities. Retail and pedestrian activity will benefit significantly.

Improve Streetscapes of Downtown Streets

The Plan gives priority to filling all downtown sidewalk discontinuities and gaps and to improving the landscaping and appearance of the east end of Mount Diablo Boulevard. The east end streetscape improvements call for a

landscaped center median, continuous street trees, landscaped setbacks, continuous sidewalks, bike lanes and more parallel on-street parking.

Improve Downtown Parking

In order to provide convenient and adequate parking in the Downtown Core, the Plan recommends parking improvements that maximize on-street parking, better management of existing off-street parking supply, and at least one dedicated public parking facility, preferably in the vicinity of the Park Theater.

Implement Private Development Regulations

The Plan makes a series of recommendations that will encourage market-feasible mixed use and residential infill while at the same time preserving the small town charm that is so important to Lafayette's identity. The key recommendations include:

- Raise density caps from 35 dwelling units per acre (dw/ac) to 45 du/ac in most areas of the Downtown Core while maintaining the current height limits.
- Raise density cap to 65 dw/ac and the height limit to four levels of residential north of Mount Diablo Boulevard in blocks backing up to the freeway within the Downtown Core.
- Allow for height limits to rise from 35' to 42.5' for parcels fronting on Mount Diablo Boulevard if applicants provide certain minimum set-backs, step-backs or a combination of both. This will encourage variations in the street wall and maintain Lafayette's more informal downtown character.

COUNCIL APPROVES SOLICITOR ORDINANCE

nspired by the tragic murder of a 90-year old woman in 2005 by a door-to-door magazine salesman, the Lafayette City Council recently approved a more restrictive solicitor ordinance. The ordinance requires that anyone soliciting in the City must first obtain a permit from the police department and display that permit visibly when going door-to-door. Those who have previously been convicted of crimes involving trespassing, theft, drug crimes, violence or crimes of a sexual nature will not be able to get a permit. The ordinance does not apply to persons under age 15 or to those who are canvassing (e.g. political campaigners).

Due to time constraints, however, in-depth background checks on those who seek to obtain permits is not feasible, and not all past criminal history may be discovered, particularly for crimes committed out of state. Therefore, you should still remain vigilant about opening your doors to strangers, even to those who may have a City solicitor permit. If you do not want to be disturbed at all, we suggest that you hang a "No Solicitors" sign near your front door. If solicitors ignore the sign, they are in violation of the ordinance. Please call police dispatch at 284-5010 for assistance. You can purchase signs at the police department (3675 Mt. Diablo Blvd., Suite 120) or most hardware stores. In the meantime, you can cut out and tape this sign to a door or window:


