DOWNTOWN LOOKING UP Lafayette Mercantile to Break Ground This Spring

You may have noticed the vacant lot across the street from Town Center. Have you ever wondered what, if anything, was going to happen to this prime piece of downtown real estate? Well, wonder no longer — Cortese Properties (owner and developer of La Fiesta Square) is scheduled to break ground this spring on the Lafayette Mercantile, a mixed-use retail and office project.

In addition to the large vacant lot, currently being used for parking, the Lafayette Mercantile project will consolidate three other parcels on the south side of Mt. Diablo Blvd. between Lafayette Circle and Dewing Ave. The new development will consist of one 2-story building and one 3-story building totaling 55,650 square feet. Retail uses, including at least one full service restaurant, will occupy the ground floors while offices will occupy the second and third floors. The project will provide 184 parking spaces on two levels, one at street level and one partially underground. There will be an additional fifteen spaces of convenient diagonal parking on Mt. Diablo Blvd. in front of the retail shops.

A courtyard and landscaped plaza will provide pedestrian access from Mt. Diablo Blvd. to the parking located at the rear of the property. Lined by decorative planters, the plaza will include a sculpture and a water feature. On the second floor, a pedestrian bridge will connect the two buildings.

Lafayette Mercantile will add life and color to the downtown retail pedestrian corridor and the City is eager to see this long vacant parcel redeveloped by a project of this caliber.

LAFAYETTE RECEIVES LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION GRANT

n November 29, 2004, Lafayette received an early holiday gift – an \$11.9 million grant to help construct the new Lafayette Library and Learning Center.

The award, from the California Public Library Construction and Renovation Bond Board, came after a year of work by City staff and volunteers that culminated in a tense daylong hearing in Sacramento. At that hearing, 72 California communities, asking for a total of \$586 million, competed for \$72 million in available funds. Lafayette, one of 20 library projects rated as "outstanding," was also competing with two other outstanding projects in Contra Costa County – Antioch and Walnut Creek.


City Manager Steve Falk said, "Every single one of those 72 projects was deserving, but the

Lafayette Library and Learning Center was distinguished by its proposal for innovative partnerships."

The new Lafayette Library and Learning Center will be home to the Glenn Seaborg Consortium, an unprecedented collaboration among 12 high-profile arts, education, and cultural organizations including the Lawrence Hall of Science, the Oakland Zoo, the Commonweath Club and the California Shakespeare Theater. The Consortium has been widely praised in prestigious

library journals around the country as a national model for future libraries. At the hearing, Lafayette representatives told the board that, "By selecting this proposal you can give the most innovative state in the union, California, the opportunity to change public libraries in this country."

Anne Grodin, former mayor of Lafayette, and chair of the Lafayette Community Foundation, says, "This is a wonderful day for Lafayette, but even more important, it's a wonderful day for libraries. Our private campaign, which will raise the critical funds not covered by public moneys, is just getting underway. Early response has been so positive because visionary supporters – individuals, families, foundations, businesses – see the same excitement that captured the bond board's attention."

The total cost of the library construction is expected to be \$31 million. Along with the state grant, a private fund raising campaign is expected to raise an additional \$11 million with the remainder of the project being funded by the Lafayette Redevelopment Agency. No funds from the City of Lafayette will be expended on this project .

Groundbreaking is scheduled for Summer 2005 and the new Lafayette Library & Learning Center will open its doors in 2008.



Moraga Road Traffic Improvements to be Completed this Summer

Based on recommendations by the Moraga Road Transportation Advisory Committee (MORTRAC), the City Council has approved a comprehensive project aimed at mitigating some of the congestion problems on Moraga Road while at the same time improving pedestrian and bicycle safety. Construction will begin in Spring 2005. The entire cost of the project, including pavement and drainage rehabilitation, is \$2 million, to be paid for by Measure C funds.

Capital improvements will include (see map):

- 1 Widening and resurfacing the pedestrian path on the east side of Moraga Road between Rosedale Ave. and Old Jonas Hill Road.
- 2 Constructing a new pedestrian path on the west side between St. Mary's Road and Tanglewood Drive.
- 3 Extending the path along the north side of School Street from First Street to Avalon Ct.
- 4 Installing an electronic warning sign for northbound Moraga Road south of Old Jonas Hill to advise motorists of congestion ahead.
- Improving the pedestrian crossing at Herman Drive.
- 6 Modifying curb ramps on First Street pathways to be in line and the same width as the path.
- 7 Installing pedestrian actuated electronic signs to more efficiently regulate east and southbound right-turn-on-red restrictions.
- Widening sidewalk along the east side of Moraga Road to improve access to the Brook Street crosswalk.
- 9 Improving the pedestrian safety at the St. Mary's Road intersection by modifying the existing island, installing crosswalks and signals and constructing a new pathway from St. Mary's Road that connects to the existing pathway on the east side of Moraga Road.
- 10 Install speed feedback signs for northbound Moraga Road near City limit (not shown).



City Fetes Mayor Erling Horn for 22 Years of Civic Duty

It all started with a traffic accident at Lafayette School. In 1982, as Erling Horn was dropping his children off at school, he witnessed the aftermath of an accident where a child had been hit by a car. Luckily, the injury was minor, but Horn fired off an angry letter to the Sun demanding that the Mayor address the dangerous traffic conditions at the site. A few weeks later, the Mayor approached Horn at his kids' soccer game and challenged him to be part of the solution by joining one of the City's commissions. Erling took that challenge to heart and after 22 years of volunteer service, Mayor Horn stepped down from the City Council dais for the last time on December 13, 2004.

Photo by: Rolfe Horn When asked about his accomplishments, Horn humorously cites his involvement in "foreign policy." Horn served as the City's representative to several organizations outside Lafayette including the League of California Cities, the National Fire Protection Association, County Connection, the Solid Waste Authority, the Bay Area Air Quality Management Board and the County Hazardous Materials Commission. "Lafayette is beautiful, but sometimes we forget that we exist within a larger area, both within the county and the state. I feel I was able to put a face on Lafayette and express our concerns and ideas to others outside our city."

Erling is very proud of the city that Lafayette has become since he moved here from Walnut Creek in 1978. "I have seen the city become much more community focused in recent years. We have been able to develop a vibrant downtown which includes restaurants with outdoor seating, art galleries, charming boutique shops, concerts in the plaza, and the Art & Wine Festival. I am pleased to have been part of many of the decisions that have made that possible – everything from sign ordinances and downtown street improvement plans to the Redevelopment Agency which will bring us a new Library and Veterans Memorial Hall."

So, what will he do now? Always supportive of the local arts and as a father to two artists himself – an internationally known photographer and a professional musician – Erling will continue to be on the scene in Lafayette attending concerts in the Plaza with his wife, Patricia, and supporting the Stanley music program. Oh, and he is also going to help his 99-year old father build a house in Oakland. Given the longevity embedded in his genes, Erling will continue to be an inspiration to our city for a long time.
