WHY DANCE?

After years and years of training, I am greeted with children's laughter as I step out into the spotlight, stuffed in a pink bunny suit with a full head mask, dancing the lead role in KT Nelson's production of *The Velveteen Rabbit*. No one can even see my face. How gratifying is that?

The company, ODC/Dance, conducted hundreds of outreach programs in schools and libraries throughout the country. We worked quickly with local children, giving them an opportunity to dance in a production with professional dancers. We taught children ways to create movement, tell stories with their bodies and hopefully, inspire them to keep creating art. We explored values of love, friendship and compassion, retelling the story of the Velveteen Rabbit with our bodies. By the sixth year in the role of the rabbit, the bunny mask itself transformed for me, as it signaled the unbridled laughter and excitement that would infuse the theatre before my entrance. Truly, what can be more gratifying than that?

Through the field of dance, I came to see that we can stimulate children to think about global questions: for example, beauty, justice, loyalty, love and as the Velveteen Rabbit would ask the Skin Horse, "What is real?" While dance may not be the best tool to proselytize political views or social mores, it is a dynamic way to explore values and engage both performers and audience in a visual dialogue about what the art might be saying about us as a people.

As I transitioned from dancer to teacher, I came to realize that dance is not about the individual on stage. Dance is about exposing individuals to different ideas, cultural diversity, creative thinking and personal expression. Dance provides students the tools to hone the body mind intelligence, much like an athlete in an individual or team sport. It is about learning physical empathy and camaraderie, which in turn allow for compassion and giving to the greater community.

This prompts me to continue asking: how can we better ourselves not only as dancers, but also as contributing citizens of our society? How can we respond to and evaluate our culture and our world through the expression of dance? How does that investigation instigate an interior revolution, in turn, allow us to address our prospective communities? When I am with my students during their daily ritual confronting themselves as dancers and as people, I am deeply optimistic that they will in fact, go on to create the kind of art that will continue this dialogue and undertaking.

WHY THE OLD LIBRARY?

Described as "nothing but cobwebs and worn out carpet, set in a mid-century modern shoe box" by the *Lamorinda Weekly*, the old library has stood quietly, almost in reticent dignity in the center of the hub bub of Lafayette downtown. As a new member of the community, I came across this building three years ago while walking my children to the fields of Lafayette Elementary. I was transfixed by its structure - lean, clean and open. A fan of midcentury architecture myself, I was fascinated by the high rectangular ceilings and yellow green stained windows. Intently peering in each single pane window, I began to put myself in this space with hundreds of other moving bodies.

As you walk under the wisteria trellis, the registrar greets you at the reception desk. Once you sign in, you walk into the dancers' lounge where there are chairs and a coffee table. Dancers are stretching, parents are chasing after their toddlers, a musician warming up on his Djembe drum and a grandfather gazing at a painting on the wall by a local artist, as he awaits his private ballroom lesson. The Studio Theatre is to the right. The high ceilings are hung with stage lights, wide mirrors grace the walls, moveable risers allow for stage space to be manipulated, dancers feet tread on sprung marley floor that keep them healthy and they are met with the raking light from the high windows. Nothing in this tall open space hinders the dancers as they leap across the span of the stage. Behind the dancers' lounge is a study room with the dance library. Young dancers close the glass sliding doors so that they can concentrate on homework, some even hold whispered discussions about the latest performance they went to see at Zellerbach Hall. To the left of the Library is the Wood Studio. The room is laden with a hardwood sprung floor. Open to yoga and somatic practitioners, local global dance groups, creative movement for children, dancers of mixed ability, the Wood Studio is a sanctuary for communal practices. The architectural through line of the brick walls act as a backdrop to dance, wellness and community.

This is it. This is where there would be dance.

The Center is conveniently located in downtown Lafayette, in the midst of commerce and within walking distance to BART. The Center opens up the possibility for a Lafayette Theatre District, starting from Town Hall to perhaps a renewed Lafayette Park Theatre or a film-viewing restaurant in the space. The Center could revive commerce in the area, demanding more dining options as audience members look to experience dinner and a show. Increase in students in the area may also demand more deli like businesses and increase revenue for existing food services like Chipotle and Whole Foods.

The Center provides an avenue for students who may want an alternative to sports in Lafayette.

The Center will bring together all arts represented under the City of Lafayette: Music, Visual Arts, Theatre and Dance.




