Which Building do you want to use?

We have based our application on 949 Moraga Road. This would be an ideal building for our use. If it is determined by the City Task Force that we should consider the Old Library site we could adjust our findings to suit that site.

Mission Statement of your organization

Determine feasibility of developing a Downtown Community Center in Lafayette for multi-generational use. Make recommendations to the Lafayette Community Foundation including site selection, proposed uses, and means of fund raising to cover costs of acquisition, remodeling, ongoing operations, and maintenance costs.



How will your organization use the building?

Lafayette Community Foundation and the Senior Services Commission are interested in developing a downtown center for multi-generational services and programming.

The only community center in Lafayette is located in the Burton Valley area, on St. Mary's Raod. Lafayette residents receive a lot of value out of the services and programs provided at that location. However, those resources are not accessible to a majority of Lafayette residents because of getting to the location requires a significant drive. Unmet demand for services exists in downtown Lafayette – for seniors who cannot drive or would prefer to not drive, families for whom the drive is too inconvenient, and middle school children who need a place to go after school. We are striving to extend and expand the services already delivered at the Community Center to downtown.

Based on our investigations, successful programming at the downtown site would include programming for special needs children, after school tutoring and classes, senior counseling, senior social activities, and evening classes/events.

Programs would generate income and pay for themselves. The build-out plan includes space that could be leased to compatible organizations, such as the Lamorinda Village. The development of the property could be and would be supported with community fundraising.



How will the Community benefit from your organization's use of the space?





Figure 16 Preferred Senior Center Location



1.0 Past and Future Use

- 1.1 The existing building at 949 Moraga is an approx. 3,600 square foot single story wood frame structure used previously as medical offices.
- 1.2 Desired program for new community space is to provide 5 private office / interview rooms and 3 activity rooms / classrooms with additional space for tutoring, plus a kitchen area.
- 1.3 Swatt Miers Architects prepared some concept images in 2012 of the building renovation which conveyed a modern style building with generous window areas, a courtyard fireplace, and a shade trellis. It is acknowledged that these concept images represent a scale of renovation beyond the basic program needs.

2.0 Occupancy

- 2.1 Proposed use of the building would be classified primarily as a 'B' occupancy per current building code.
- Office, interview, tutor, and kitchen spaces would be calculated at 100 sq. ft. per person and classroom spaces would calculate at 20 sf/ person.
- 2.3 3 classrooms at 500 sq. ft. each would equal 75 occupants (1500/20).
- 2.4 The remaining occupied space of roughly 800 sq. ft. would equal 8 occupants (800/100).
- 2.5 For planning purposes, future use of the building should accommodate 83 occupants.
- 2.6 2,300 sq. ft. of the building is figured to be these dedicated uses and 1,300 sq. ft. is figured to be circulation, restrooms, utility spaces, storage, and structure for a total of 3,600 sf.

3.0 Design Issues

- 3.1 For life safety purposes, this occupant load will require at least two exits with sufficient distance apart, clear and unobstructed acces, no dead-end corridors over 20 feet, and clear exterior pathway leading away from the building. Currently, exit ways leading into the courtyard do not provide code compliant pathways.
- 3.2 Basic code required accessibility will be required for primary entrances, restrooms, etc.
- 3.3 A suggested design idea is to change the primary building entrance to the wall facing the parking lot.
- 3.4 Seismic codes will require some additional lateral stability in the form of shear walls or braced frames.
- 3.5 Energy codes may require upgrades to the performance of the building envelope in the form of insulating glass windows or additional floor, wall and roof insulation.
- 3.6 Relocating the courtyard compressor units and front wall package unit has been a stated renovation desire.

4.0 Project Scope Variations

- For project cost estimating purposes, the scope of the project can be defined and analyzed in successive stages of scale, complexity, and expense.
- 4.2 Stage one vision can be termed the basic code compliance upgrades necessary to secure an occupancy permit. Stage two vision would involve sufficient renovation to bring about the stated basic program needs. Stage three vision would represent the work needed to achieve the renovation imagery conveyed in the conceptual renderings presented last year..


- 4.3 Stage 1 Vision Occupancy Permit: only the work required to meet minimum code required upgrades as well as any repairs to basic building systems. Repair and replacement of finishes as necessary to put back fit and finish affected by required upgrade work. New roofing. Stage 1 hard and soft costs minimum budgeting at \$45-50 / square foot would provide \$160,000 funding target.
- 4.4 Stage 2 Vision Basic Program: Stage 1 work plus demolition and renovation work required to achieve the new building program as stated above. Complete upgrades to the comfort systems, new lighting and finishes throughout. Stage 2 hard and soft costs minimum budgeting at \$150 / square foot would provide \$540,000 funding target.
- 4.5 Stage 3 Vision Community Center: Stage 1 and 2 work plus demolition and renovation work required to achieve the new building program as stated above, as well as exterior improvement to provide an exemplary new facility for the City. Window walls, new entrance, Courtyard fireplace and other improvements, structural framing to achieve larger window expanses, re-routing of utility services, plus selected site improvements. Stage 3 hard and soft costs minimum budgeting at \$275 / square foot would provide \$990,000 funding target.
- 4.6 These target estimates are opinions of minimum probable costs and don't account for unforeseen contingencies.
- 4.7 These estimates are intended to be complete for each variation described if taken as a whole. If taken in phased increments, there would be some added costs as some work from earlier phases may need to be re-done in later phases.




