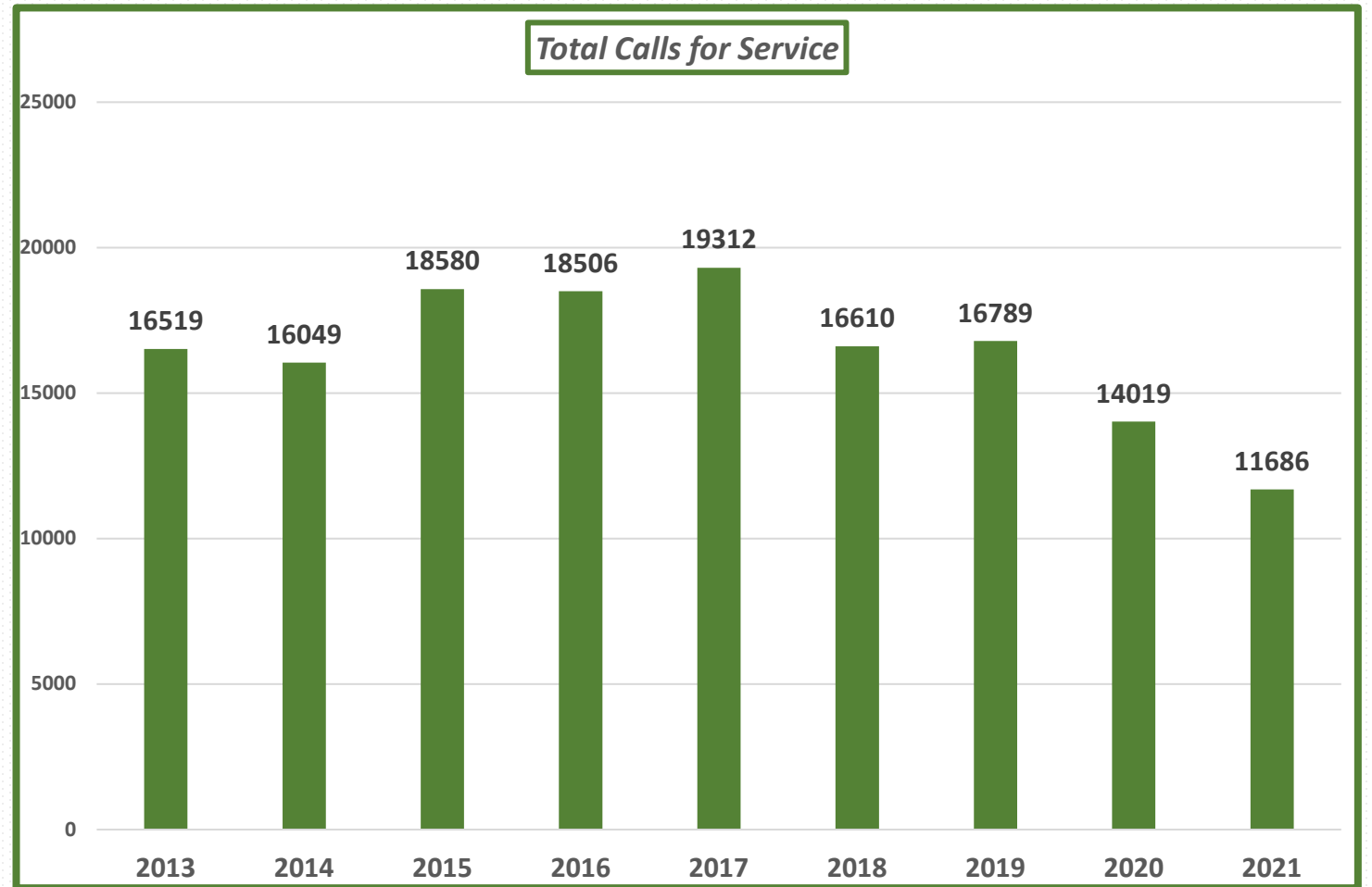

January – June 2022

From January to June,
Lafayette PD had
5,648 calls for service.





January – June 2022

Additional Data for January to June 2022

- Of the 5,648 calls, 53.4% were initiated by Officers.
- Officers issued 784 citations. *(900 total for 2021)*
- Officers took 553 police reports. *(1085 total for 2021)*
- Officers made 124 arrests. *(261 total for 2021)*



January – June 2022

Felony Person Crimes

Crimes against persons are the highest priority as they have the largest impact on the victim.

January to June:

- 0 Assault with Deadly Weapon *(4 total for 2021)*
- 3 Robberies (1 armed/2 strong-armed) *(5 total for 2021)*
- 1 Rape *(2 total for 2021)*
- 4 Domestic Violence *(7 total for 2021)*

(There have been no reported child sexual assaults this year.)



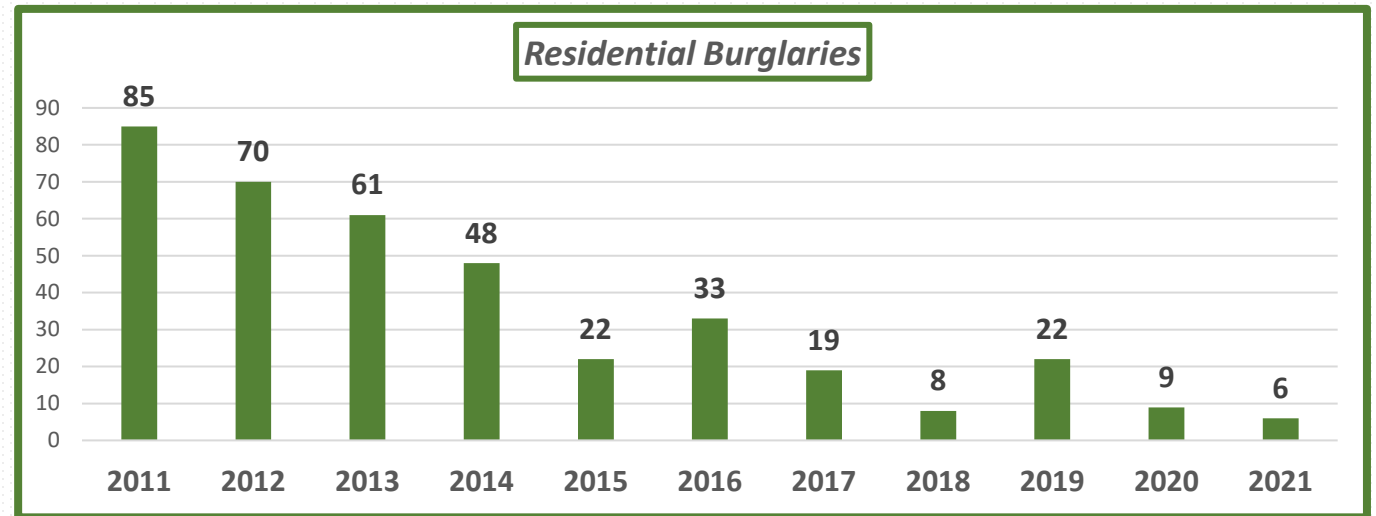
January – June 2022

Property Crimes

The largest number of crimes that occur within Lafayette are those that target items of property.

Residential Burglaries

Between January and June there were 8 Residential Burglaries (6 for 2021)

- 5 Grand Theft from Vehicle *(9 for 2021)*
- 23 Petty Theft from Vehicle *(33 for 2021)*

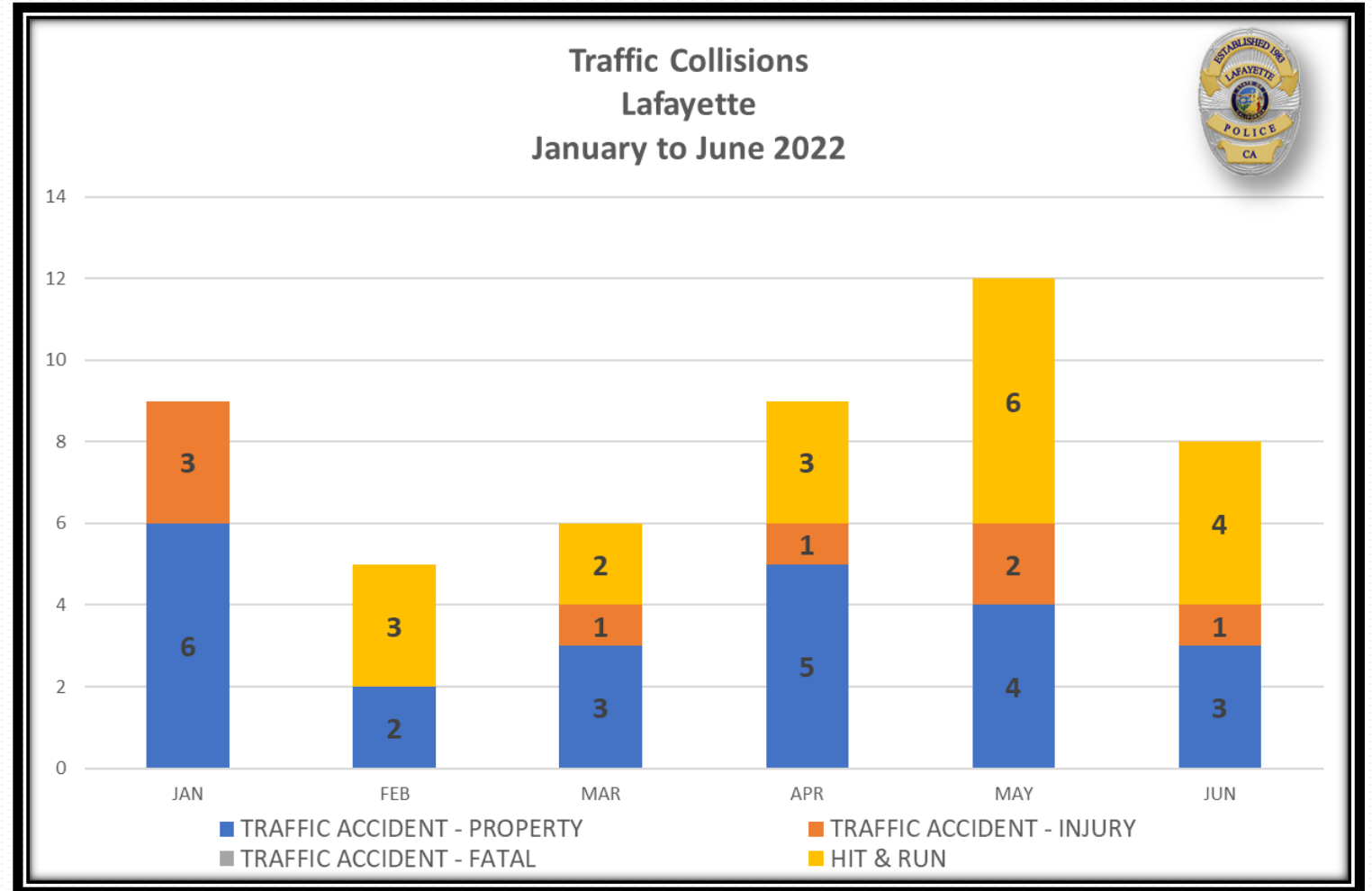
Traffic Collisions – Property Damage Only

- 17 YTD (30 for 2021)

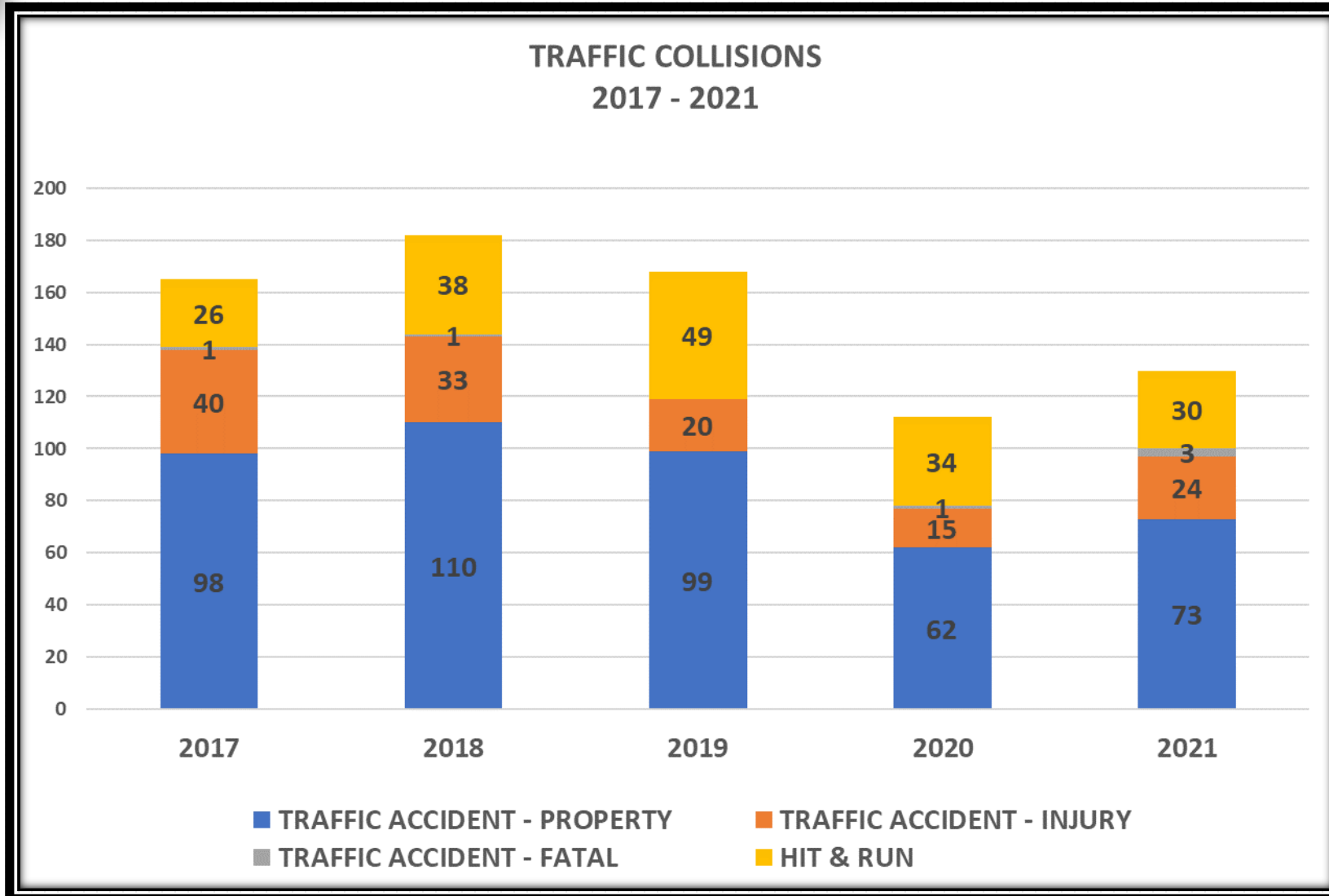
No Hit & Run – With Injuries or Fatalities YTD

Bringing back the Citizens Academy starting Fall of 2022.

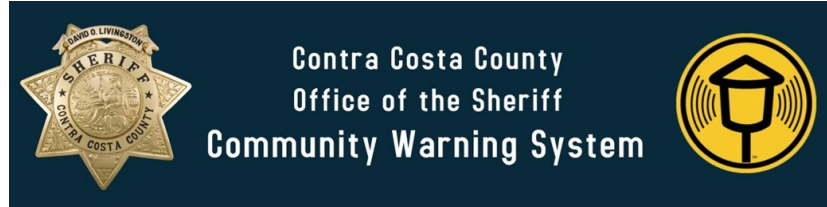

Emergency Preparedness

The City of Lafayette Police Department has continued to upgrade its state-of-the-art redundant communications system to enhance the safety of Lafayette citizens and visitors.

- New Mobile Communications/Drone Command truck. Capable of offroad operation, this vehicle can serve as a command post and communication hub when traditional means (cellular/radio) is not available. Uses 4 separate radio systems, to provide internet to those nearby and can be used as a radio repeater for communication between agencies.
- New Shared Microwave Internet system. In combination with the work done to install wildfire cameras, the City of Lafayette has also installed a redundant microwave communication system at antenna towers surrounding the Lamorinda area.



January – June 2022

School Safety

The City of Lafayette has dedicated resources to providing improved school safety to all schools in the Lafayette area. These improved resources focus on communications and training.

- Added mobile radios at each school in Lafayette. Every school office has been given a radio that utilizes the same multi-county radio network that your police and fire department use daily.
- Added mobile communications radio channel into First Student school buses. These radios direct communication between first responders and bus drivers during time of disaster.
- New training with school staff on communications protocols and documentation. Beginning August 2022, City of Lafayette Police will be working with each school to join a weekly radio “Net”.
